THEA 170 - Fundamentals of Acting (3 credit hours)

Course Description:

An introduction to the craft of acting that explores Stanislavski's techniques through nonverbal and scripted scene work.

SAMPLE COURSE OVERVIEW

This class will allow the student to take an inside look at the work of a stage actor, and will follow the creative process. It will allow the student to experience the craft of acting from auditioning for a role, the first read through, the rehearsal process up to final dress rehearsal and performance.

Performance Training Disclosure:

The Department of Theatre and Dance endorses the concept that the body is the performer's true instrument of creativity and craft. It is through the body (including voice production) that a performer communicates to an audience. Consequently, the nature of performing training will at times require physical touch between instructor and student and/or between student and student in order to clarify or demonstrate the body's processes as related to actor training. - 5. Analyze plays and create a character analysis from the actor's perspective
- 6. Rehearse and work creatively with other people
- 7. Perform a scene
- 8. Perform a monologue and audition
- 9. Critically evaluate theatrical productions

- **10. Memorization and Reading for Assignments:** You will be responsible for reading three plays: one for script analysis in class and the two plays you will be performing pieces from. You will also need to read assigned chapters in *Acting Essentials.* You will be responsible for memorizing three pieces: a one page open scene, one short scripted scene and a one-minute monologue.
